A Legacy in the Making: Two Decades of Dedication,

Innovation, and Joy in Education

This fall, SYV Family School celebrates a remarkable milestone: Julianne Tullis-Thompson's twentieth year of service. What began in 2005 as a part-time teaching role in Purple Door has grown into two decades of steady leadership, joyful teaching, and tireless devotion to our community. Over the years, she has shepherded Family School through times of challenge and triumph, guiding us with resilience, compassion, and a belief in the power of children to love learning.

Julianne's journey is both personal and profound. From leading lively social studies simulations that sparked joy in her earliest students, to restructuring classrooms and finances during difficult times, to championing teacher development, her vision has shaped the school we know today. Through it all, she has remained grounded in the values that first drew her here: respect for children, trust in teachers, and a community that cherishes connection.

Twenty years in, her work is still evolving—and her legacy is still being written.

What first drew you to Family School and how did you know it was the right place for you?

Coming to Family School was unlike any school I had experienced. From the start, the philosophy of inspiring children to love learning filled my heart. In 2005 I was returning to work after maternity leave, and Family School was the only part-time teaching position available in the valley. I was blessed to work with amazing teachers: Sandy Hanes, Debbie Esser, Lynn Rector, Gail Wolf, Lissa Samuel and Miki Holden, who mentored me and taught me to trust my instincts.



What lessons have you learned along the way?

I've learned countless lessons along the way. When I stepped into this role, I never imagined I would also become a finance person, an event planner, a psychologist, a career counselor, and a cheerleader. And yet, this is only the beginning of my learning journey—there is still so much more to learn and do.

What are some of the biggest challenges you've faced, and how did you overcome them?

At the end of my first year as Head, I discovered financial mismanagement. I was fortunate to have the support of board members Gordon Miller, David Lawrence, and Steve Finkel. Gordon spearheaded remarkable fundraising efforts that helped us through that crisis.

Two years later, we faced another challenge: our staffing model, valley demographics, and our then-low tuition rate made the school financially unsustainable and put us at risk of closure. Restructuring into multi-age classrooms allowed us to better meet students' needs in a more sustainable way.

In the years that followed, a team of powerful women—including Marnie Diamond, Amy Grenier, Liz Tyng, Kay Knightley, and countless others—took on the work of evaluating our entire model. Their efforts brought greater financial transparency, a stronger system of checks and balances, Through their tireless dedication and a devoted staff, we not only survived but built a stronger foundation for the future.

What are you most proud of as Head of School?

In 2012, we operated in the negative, our teachers were underpaid, and we struggled to retain families. Today, we have close to a \$1 million reserve, competitive teacher salaries, and a robust professional development program. I'm especially proud of how many teachers have started in entry level positions and gone on to pursue further education and growth.

As you look to the future, what excites you most?

Education never stagnates—each year brings new students, families, and opportunities to grow. I'm excited about the possibility of an endowment, expanding our Student Advanced Support program, and even imagining housing for staff one day. Most of all, I look forward to nurturing the next generation of teachers to continue this work.





Griffin Markee, Class of 2018

This fall, Griffin Markee began his freshman year of college at Soka University of America, carrying with him a strong sense of curiosity and connection that he traces back to his years at Family School.

"The experiences that have stayed with me the longest would have to be the small class size and bonding that we would go through during our trips to Camp Ocean Pines and Sedgwick," Griffin reflects. "I think the skills I learned from growing up in such a small environment have helped me in developing relationships with my peers and teachers in high school and is continuing to help me now in college."

That supportive environment also sparked Griffin's intellectual curiosity. He recalls the joy of hands-on learning, including building Rube Goldberg contraptions for Einstein Day. "The embrace I had from my teachers helped me realize, that if I am passionate about it, people will be willing to help," he says.

Now, as he embarks on his college journey studying psychology, Griffin is eager to connect with new classmates from around the world while also tackling the challenge of learning Japanese. "I am very excited to build friendships with new people... However, I expect that [learning Japanese] will be a huge challenge I will slowly start to face

as it gets more and more complex."

Daniella Gelles, Class of 2014

After recently graduating from Amherst College, Daniella Gelles is setting out on her next adventure: a ten-month term of service with AmeriCorps NCCC. Based first in Minnesota, she'll be traveling across the country with a team of young adults to take on projects ranging from disaster relief, to infrastructure work, to youth development.

"It's a team-based community service term which involves traveling to different project sites across the U.S. in a group of 18–24 year olds," Daniella explains. "So I'll be all over the place, starting in Minnesota for the first project!"

Daniella credits her time at Family School with instilling the values that guide her today. "Family School showed me the importance of community from a young age, leading me to seek it out throughout my life, including now with AmeriCorps which involves living and working in a team of 10 young adults," she says.

"It also fostered curiosity and openmindedness which has pushed me to new and exciting experiences such as this."

Looking ahead, she's eager to embrace the opportunities and challenges of this new chapter. "For AmeriCorps NCCC, I'm most excited to see new places while making a positive impact on others and developing my own skills," Daniella shares.

From her early lessons in collaboration and curiosity at Family School, to a life of service and discovery, Daniella continues to carry those values into each new experience.

As we begin the 51st year at SYV Family School, I want to start with gratitude—for our current and alumni families, faculty and staff, and supporters near and far.

In my role as both a parent and Chair of the Board of Trustees, I've seen from a unique perspective, the positive impact of your effort, financial support, and care. Each morning's drive up Figueroa Mountain Road leads to something special: a community that is welcoming, supportive, and deeply committed to these formative years in our children's education.

I have lived in the valley for just shy of four years, and in that short time, Family School has been a staple in three of our children's lives. While two of them are now at Dunn Middle School, they have carried their love of learning with them and approach their educational journey in a curious and thoughtful way. While I'd love to credit that to exceptional parenting, this is truly the result of the intentional spirit that was created on our campus more than five decades ago.

As a board, our primary goal is to ensure the long-term sustainability of the school. While this sounds simple, it is more than just ensuring that we have "money in the bank" (although that is important!). Last year, as part of our periodic review by the California Association of Independent Schools, we developed a Strategic Plan that sharpened our priorities and will anchor us in the coming years.

Thanks to a successful Bounty and Annual Fund, last year was a momentous one financially. We invested much of that support directly into our operating budget in the form of additional staff, expanding Specialty Programs for students, and enhancing benefits for faculty and staff. With more hands on campus, we are off to a strong start this year. We also strengthened our cash reserves, placing us in a more secure financial position for the future.

That said, we continue to operate on a tight budget. Without Bounty this year, meeting our Annual Fund goal is especially critical. Your generosity supports teachers, enriches programs, and ensures Family School remains strong for future generations.



At our 2025 Bounty of the Valley, our paddle raise directed restricted funds to enrich and expand our students' daily experience. This year, those gifts support our Student Advanced Support (SAS) program as well as specialty classes such as Performing Arts, PE, Spanish, Samala Language and Culture, and Art, programs that shape the whole child and set Family School apart.



Meanwhile, Annual Fund contributions close the gap between tuition and the cost of running the school, ensuring that any family can access a Family School education. By covering this essential need, the Annual Fund allows us to cover Tuition Assistance and Remission expenses and frees up other fundraising monies to go directly to program and professional development.
