



Isabel Huerta, Class of 2012

Building Community, Leading with Curiosity, and Staying True to Her Roots

When Isabel Huerta reflects on her time at SYV Family School, the memories are warm, vivid, and woven with deep meaning. "One of the biggest things people are searching for is a village—but they don't always know how to be a villager," she shares. "At Family School, we learned how to be great neighbors and friends. We learned how to lean on each other."

Isabel's reflections reveal a profound appreciation for the close-knit, values-driven environment she grew up in. She speaks fondly of a school culture that nurtured emotional intelligence, embraced curiosity, and encouraged students to show up authentically. "It was a place where no question was a stupid question," she says. "We were taught to tap into multiple strengths: connect, be curious, and work through disagreements—which is so important in life, not just in school."

Two teachers, in particular, had a lasting impact: Karen Johnson and Cynthia Devine. "Karen was such a safe person for my mom when she was still learning English," Isabel recalls. "She helped my family feel seen and supported, even beyond the classroom." Her connection to Karen, who taught her in the ocean-themed Blue Door class, helped her overcome early shyness and feel at home, even while navigating a new language and culture.

Cynthia Devine, an art teacher and creative mentor, also helped Isabel step into her confidence. "She called me a Renaissance woman," Isabel laughs. "She saw all the pieces that make you who you are and uplifted them." Through theater-art fusion camps hosted in Cynthia's home, Isabel discovered a love for storytelling, performance, and expression—seeds that would bloom in unexpected ways later on.

After transitioning from Family School to Santa Barbara public schools, Isabel quickly found herself thriving. "The accelerated math at Family School gave me a huge head start," she notes. At San Marcos High School, she threw herself into student government, community service, and even

Flamenco dance. "I loved school. I wasn't naturally smart—it took work—but I knew how to ask for help and build connections. That foundation came from Family School."

Isabel carried those skills to UC Berkeley, where she double majored in Legal Studies and Ethnic Studies, minored in Race and Law, joined Greek life, and served in student government. "At first I thought, 'How am I going to make a 40,000-person school feel small?' But because of my experience in a small school, I knew how to find and build community."

The ability to build community and a fearless curiosity propelled her quickly after graduation. From development work at Berkeley to a leadership role in the California Governor's Office as Deputy Director of Digital Communications, Isabel credits her Family School roots. "I had impostor syndrome applying for this job," she admits. "But I wasn't afraid to be wrong. I was adaptable. I had "soft skills" that gave me an advantage in every room I've been in."

Looking back, Isabel's message to current students and families is clear: "So much of your success will come from knowing how to connect with teachers, mentors, and peers. Cultivate those relationships. Stay curious. And don't be afraid to take up space."

As she continues traveling the state and supporting the state's initiatives, Isabel carries Family School's legacy with her—not just in her work, but in her way of being: grounded, open, and deeply connected.

A Legacy of Community and Education


Ken and Lloyd Mills moved to Solvang in the summer of 1972, instantly feeling at home in the Santa Ynez Valley, where they settled in to raise their three children, Bonnie, Chris, and David. Their deep commitment to education, the arts, and community service left a lasting imprint on this Valley they so loved. Over the decades, they dedicated themselves to enriching the lives of others, whether through their leadership in local organizations, their support of schools, or their passion for outdoor adventures.

Together, Ken and Lloyd nurtured a love for the arts in the Valley, supporting outdoor adventures and preserving our natural environments. The Mills family passionately supported the SYV Family School before and after their granddaughter, Marisol, attended, and they became an integral part of our campus development. Among their many early contributions, they sponsored the construction of our Blue Door building.

Ken and Lloyd Mills embodied the community spirit, leaving a legacy of generosity, leadership, and adventure. Their dedication to our school family, outdoor education, and natural environment greatly enriched our school, ensuring their influence will be felt for generations.







David & Jan Crosby Champions of Music and Education

Known for his legendary music with The Byrds and Crosby, Stills and Nash, long-time resident and music legend David Crosby and his wife, Jan, were passionate supporters of music and musical education in the Santa Ynez Valley. The Crosbys were advocates for progressive education, and their son Django (class of 2006) attended SYV Family School.

David's generosity led him to perform live frequently and host concerts that helped fund instruments for local schools and music programs throughout the Valley, giving countless children access to the transformative power of music. The Crosbys were

supporters of the SYV Family School even in the years after their son attended, making it possible to keep programs like music and art as an integral part of our curriculum year after year.

David's commitment to fostering creativity in young artists reflected his lifelong love for music. Through his contributions, both on and off the stage, David Crosby left an enduring legacy in the Santa Ynez Valley and in the history of SYV Family School one of inspiration, generosity, and a belief in the power of music to shape lives.

Jim Clendenen

A Legacy of Wine and Generosity


The legendary winemaker Jim Clendenen founded Au Bon Climat in 1982. He pioneered a new era of winemaking in Santa Barbara County, earning him international acclaim, including Winemaker of the Year by Food & Wine and the James Beard Foundation's Who's Who of Food and Beverage in America.

Jim and his wife, Morgan, contributed to the SYV Family School each year as they donated a special lunch to the school's auction, an event that raised essential funds and brought us together around their shared love of food, wine, and education. Their support also extended to the school's Cuvees wine program, which produced both the Habits of Mind and Legacy vintages. Morgan played a key role in its inception, and Jim's deep winemaking expertise shaped its success. Their children Knox and Isabella attended the school, further solidifying their connection to its mission.

The Clendenens' belief in fostering creativity, curiosity, and resilience in young minds continues to shape the school's mission. Their generosity has left an indelible mark on the SYV Family School, ensuring that future generations can access an enriching and inspiring education.







Dr. Louie Netzer was more than a beloved physician; he was a visionary, a healer, and a force of compassion in the Santa Ynez Valley and beyond. His impact stretched far beyond his medical practice, shaping the very fabric of the community through his instrumental roles in founding the SYV Family School, Friendship House, Country Medical Clinic, and the Side Street Cafe.

Dr. Netzer and his wife, Helen, are among the names found in the original articles of incorporation of the SYV Family School. They were part of the seven core families who had a vision for a school that supported an enriching environment and interactive curriculum.

Later in life, when most would have settled into retirement, Louie journeyed deep into the Amazon, founding Bolivia's Rio Beni Health Project. Speaking to students and teachers at Dunn Middle School in 2001, he shared his simple yet profound philosophy: "I happen to think that relationships between people—from friendships to love—are far and away the most important thing in the world."

Louie's legacy lives on, not just in the institutions he helped build but in the countless lives he touched with his unwavering belief in the power of love and community.
